### FACTS ABOUT NEPAL




Nepal is a small landlocked country sandwiched between China to the north and India to the south. It is one of the poorest countries in Asia with a population of just over 30 million, a life expectancy of 67 years and a literacy rate of 57%. The main religion is Hindu (83%) followed by Buddhist (9%), Muslim (4%), then Christian and others.

The capital is Kathmandu situated in the Kathmandu Valley and home to many UNESCO World Heritage sites.

Nepal is home to 8 of the 10 highest mountains in the world, Mt Everest being the highest. These mountains are a magnet to climbers and adventurers making tourism one of Nepal's main incomes.

Nepal is truly a 3<sup>rd</sup> world country with a large percentage of the population without direct access to water, electricity and medical services.

### PRESIDENTS REPORT



The past twelve months has seen the completion of the new Sai Home on the outskirts of Kathmandu. The home is now under the ownership of our Nepal partner – Dharmik Nepal and the Sai Home committee. After years of paying rent and leases not being renewed, the children and their carers now have a house of their own.

The official opening of the Shree Radha Krishna School, one and half hours drive east of Kathmandu was held in October

2018, with myself, Treasurer Rohan and our eldest son Nicholas in attendance. This is the third school The Asha Foundation has constructed since the devastating earthquake of 2015. When travelling to Nepal, no Asha Foundation funds are used for travel, accommodation, meals etc. We at Asha pride ourselves in allocating all donor and sponsorship funds to our work in Nepal.

Our Asha children continue to do well at school with three of our older children now enrolled in tertiary education degrees. For Asha to be able to financially support their chosen career paths certainly puts weight behind our Mission Statement "Improving the lives of underprivileged children in Nepal through education".

Our sponsorship programme is the backbone of our work in Nepal and I am happy to say that during the past financial year we have gained new sponsors and more importantly retained our loyal sponsors many of whom have been with us since our conception back in 2007.

In closing I would like to say a huge thank you to my hardworking Australian committee, our Nepal Manager Satish Tamang, Nepal President & Cultural Advisor Narayan Shrestha, office assistant Sumali Shrestha and our wonderful sponsors and donors. None of our work in Nepal would be possible without you.



# Sponsorship



**The** welfare of our children is of the upmost importance to The Asha Foundation. In 2007 we were supporting 16 children in a small dwelling in the northern area of Kathmandu, today our sponsorship programme supports over 30 children in two children's homes.

All our children receive private school education which is preferable to the government schooling where teaching quality is poor and classrooms overcrowded. We are incredibly proud of the children's achievements, whether it be academic, sporting or community involvement. The carers and management teams at both the Sai Home and CCRC are to be complimented in steering the children in the right direction and preparing them for life outside their home.

We now have 3 older children enrolled in tertiary colleges, two completing a four year degree in Applied Science – Microbiology and another completing a four year degree in Business Management. Prior to 2007 none of these children could imagine they would be able to go to college, but thanks to Asha and our wonderful sponsors and donors, we have made this a reality.

Transparency to our sponsors and donors is of utmost importance and we can proudly say that 100% of sponsorship funds go towards our sponsorship programmes.

### INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT TO THE MEMBERS OF THE ASHA FOUNDATION INCORPORATED
